Family's First Conference Provides Meaningful Experience for All

Our family lost an incredible person on December 13, 2021. Matthew, our son and brother, left us unexpectedly in his sleep, four days shy of his 28th birthday. Matthew has two sisters, and he also left behind the love of his life, his fiancée Julia. Matthew and Julia were to be married on July 14th last summer. Instead, my wife Betsy, our daughter Camille and I attended our first TCF National Conference.

We found the conference to be a beautiful, loving, sad, intense, hopeful, difficult, caring event. Betsy, Camille and I all gained from our experience, and we talked about getting to New Orleans in 2024 as soon as the event ended. We are hopeful that our older daughter Carmen can also attend.

For Betsy and I, the conference provided some healing and hope. They are busy days, filled with a variety of sessions where speakers talk about their loss, and their path to hope and joy again. While the days are filled, the conference leaders and speakers make it crystal clear that the time is each of ours. Do as you wish. On the second day last year, I simply went outside and sat for an hour. I needed some alone time. You do what is good for you.

Each session provides a nugget or two for attendees to possibly take back home with them. Something to think about, lean on or maybe even do something. The ability to meet and hug so many other people in this club is another benefit to attending. meaningful. She finally could be who she is now. We become somewhat different people when we lose a child, sibling, or grandchild. We hold in a lot to protect those that don't understand. Camille met some of her "sibs" that she zooms with weekly, and it was wonderful. She met many other sibs as well.

I was struck by the outpouring of love the sibs have for each other, their ability to lift each other up, and their "driving force" that emanated throughout the event. For me to see Camille in the grand ballroom with her sibs, and to listen to her words late at night, was both painful and comforting. Painful because she needs to rely on her new sibs to carry her through her life, rather than spend her life with Matthew, but comforting knowing that she will be okay for the very same reason.

One of my favorite sessions in Denver was the Sib panel, where the room was filled with parents who were given the opportunity to ask the panel any questions they desired. I could see, hear and feel the emotions of the sibs as they discussed their collective losses, their relationships with their parents, and as they gave their advice to us on how to live with our kids that we still have here on earth.

2023 was our first year attending the National Conference, but it won't be our last. We will be in New Orleans, sizzling hot as it may be, because we need to be there.

Courage – A Surprise – An Understanding

Attendance Requirement: Courage

I don't think I am unique. I did NOT want to attend a meeting of The Compassionate Friends. I was coerced by my wife. It was subtle but effective. My son, on the other hand, made 'a Devil's deal;' he agreed to go to the next meeting in exchange for a favor—his debt some weeks away. The thought of discussing death nauseates. We, my son and I, made a bad deal.

The Meeting: A Surprise

I was surprised to find I was not the only man to have lost a child. There was a reality to that recognition. My loss, not unlike yours, is a personal matter. No one can tell me how I feel or how I ought to feel. Yet, the group never made me feel guilty about my selfishness; they understood.

The Result: An Understanding

The Compassionate Friends is not an efficient organization. There are no systems, no quick easy cures. Grief is a catharsis. Most of what you hear here you will dismiss; it will not apply to you. But there are nuggets—small ideas you will want to try or things you want to think about. Some you will try. Many you will discard. Only a few will help the pain. These, you will treasure. Your friends and associates may try to understand your grief and try to help. They can do neither. They don't understand. The people who attend the meetings do understand. And they try to help.

My son felt he had gained little from the meeting. Yet he left feeling he had helped someone else deal with his grief. What a marvelous satisfaction for a 15-year-old.

What's In It For You?

The Compassionate Friends is here to help—to listen, to suggest, to understand. If you handle your grief well, you do not need The Compassionate Friends. But we need you! Your approach or method of dealing with grief could help one or more of us. Please share it.

The card text was missing periods. In his youth my son wrote long sentences with no periods. This card was perfect for him! It read:

"There once was a son who was loved by everyone He was gifted and smart With such a big heart. He's the best son you could find" (open the card) "And I'm so glad he's mine! Happy Birthday."

The card came home with me. I read it again and again.

It was an impulse buy. Was this off balance? Am I OK? It cost \$3.29 plus tax. What do I do with it now?

I pushed that hesitation away, opened the card and wrote "Love you, Art," and signed it "Mom." I added the date and wrote "See you sometime. One day."

I tucked it into a dining room drawer full of family cards given and received over many years.

Three years later I found that card as I was looking for another card. This time I smiled and pinned the card to my desk lamp where I see it every day.

I fully accept purchasing a birthday card for my tall, friendly 20-year old son who died 15 years ago.

Readers not familiar with child loss will find this story "absurd." Webster's Dictionary defines it as extremely poor reasoning, ridiculous, nonsense. Compassionate Friends find nothing wrong with a bereaved mom purchasing a card for a son or daughter who died years ago.

Sometimes Compassionate Friends and everyone else live on opposite planets. I can live with that.

Parents love their children. Siblings love their siblings. We will always remember them and honor them, especially on their birthdays.

Vacation time can be painful for bereaved parents. Caught up with normal demands of making a living or keeping a household going, we have less time to think than we do on vacations, especially the "take it easy" kind-at a hideaway, tucked away somewhere.

In the summers following Tricia's death, I found vacations could bring a special kind of pain. We avoided going to places where we had vacationed with her. At one time, I thought Williamsburg might be off my list forever since we had a very happy time together there. I tried it one summer three years later and found that she walked the cobbled streets with me. Now that nine years have passed and the pain has eased, maybe the happy memories we shared in Williamsburg can heighten the pleasure of another visit there.

For the first few years after Tricia's death, we found fast-paced vacations at places we had never been before, to be the best. The stimulation of new experiences in new places with new people refreshed us and sent us home more ready to pick up our grief work. That is not to say when we did something or saw something that Tricia would have enjoyed, we didn't mention her. We did, but it seemed less painful than at home.

One caution: Do allow enough time for sleep; otherwise, an exhausted body can depress you.

We've said it many times: YOU HAVE TO FIND YOUR OWN WAY, YOUR OWN PEACE. Let vacation time be another try at that; but do give yourself a break in choosing the time and locale where that can best be accomplished. Don't be afraid of change-it can help with your re-evaluation of life.
